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Session Learning Outcomes

By the end of this session, delegates will be able to:

- Use a traditional Marxist analysis as a lens to explore educational development in the LJK
- Critique educational development scholarship using one of the 'grand narratives'
- Consider their own work in the light of developments in capitalism and the global crisis

Session Outline

- As a newer area of study, it is hard to point to the feminist or marxist or post modernist educational development research.
- Much of the work of educational development research has been dedicated to giving an account of teaching and learning and change in universities and finding ways of reconciling 'what could be' with 'what is'
- Is the scholarship of educational development rationalising the higher educational enterprise in itself with the latest manifestation of capitalism and state rule?
- How might we conceptualise our work if we were to take for example a Marxist approach to educational development?

Dialogue 1 – to what extent from a Marxist perspective, is educational development a tool of capitalism?
